with CW2 The sep I moved to Camp Victory and was assigned to the 205th Headquarters, in the S3 shop as an LNO, working for the second (S-3) and SGM (S3 Ops SGM), supporting various Tactical HUMINT Teams (THTs). Starting in Sep most of the interrogators under me moved to AG, the remainder occasionally visited AG but were not assigned there. The ones that moved were

sure. Two personnel who may have some knowledge of activities at AG from the Nov 03 to March 04 time frame would be the acting Company Commander, Amount and the acting 1SG, 1SG and due to their occasional visits to AG. During the period from mid-December 03 until late Feb 04, I was assigned as a liaison officer between the Bde S-3 shop and Abu Ghraib (AG).
