1949 Geneva Conventions

- Humanely treated, maintain protective clothing, boots, pro mask and food
- POW's life may not be threatened, and can not be a human shield
- He may not be humiliated through insults or public display
- Inhumane treatment is punishable under international law and the UCMJ

5 SS Of POW Handling

- SEARCH
- SILENCE
- SEGREGATE
- SAFEGUARD
- SPEED TO THE REAR

SEARCH

- Disarm, and place in stress position, prefer
two per POW
- Check entire body for concealed weapons,
shoe laces, razor blades, pocket knives
- New, unfamiliar weapons need to be tagged
and sent with prisoner, others destroyed
- Protective gear remains with POW

- Recorded information in POW possession is captured enemy document, need tagging
- Official: FM, maps, overlays, orders- are logged and confiscated
- Personal: Letters, diaries, books- should be logged and returned
- Valuables such as money and jewelry should be impounded, hand receipt to POW

SEARCH

SILENCE & SEGREGATE

- Strict discipline should be used to maintain Silence, preserving shock of capture
- Segregation should occur ASAP
- Officers, NCOs; Lower enlisted
- Female soldiers (same grouping as above)
- Deserters/Non-combatants
- Ranking individuals will influence subordinates

SAFEGUARD & SPEED TO THE REAR

- Safeguard- POW must be protected against violence, insult, curiosity or reprisal

Speed to the Rear- Normal chain of evacuation is by SOP, usually to the Brigade Support Area


