Several interrogation techniques were authorized. I could question detainees as often as I wawad. We had some of the detainees stand for a few minutes, but not for extended periods of time. I did not use any other stress position like the push-up position or kneeling or arms up or anything. You can have them ait down or stand, but not for extended periods of time. A did not use temperature control as an interrogation technique. We did not even the standard periods of time. We did not even have an air conditioner.

Sleep management was implemented by waking detainers up at different hours to interview them and for food and showers. We could limit their sleep to four hours per 24 hour period for up to 72 hours. We would hang on the cell door to wake detainees up.

I feel that the cells wore to standards for the situation that we were in. The cell has a thin steel door. The were five calls and each was about two feet wide, three to three and half feet tail and no more than about 4 to 6 feet in depth. The inner walls were made of cinder block. We maintained some of the detainces in the cell area except for lattine breaks, eating, showerg, as well as interviewing. The detainses could sit and some could lay down in the cells. When we went to talk to detain the bigger room some would sit and look at the wall. Not all of the detainses entered the cells, there are 2 different rooms and in the bigger room some would sit and look at the wall. There were two separate closed circuit TV cameras for the main room and the cell area that were monitored by the operation room in the team house.

All of the detainees received three meals a day and they were served the same food that we ate at the seam house. There were only two times that I served them MREs. The detainees were not denied food, where may and deprived of food for any time and there was plenty of water. We never restricted the detainees to a diet of bread and water.


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
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
