[redacted] was interviewed at Camp Delta, U.S. Naval Base, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba by FBI Special Agent [redacted] and Secret Service Special Agent [redacted]. Translation services for this interview were provided by a military linguist and SA [redacted]. After being advised of the nature of the interview, [redacted] provided the following information:

Upon entering the interview booth, [redacted] was shivering from having come in from the rain. He was provided a towel to dry off and help keep warm. The purpose of the interview was for the new interviewing agents to build rapport with [redacted] and encourage his continued cooperation. The interviewing agents began the interview by apologizing to [redacted] for the amount of time he sat in the interview booth subsequent to the last interview. The interviewing agents explained, it was a miscommunication between the teams, each having thought the other had informed the guards they had finished with [redacted]. They explained it was not intentional and offered their apologies for the mix up. [redacted] stated he understood and accepted the apology.

The interviewing agents then explained to [redacted] they understood his frustrations and the fact he is tired of defending himself. However, the interviewing agents told [redacted] he needs to find the strength to continue to cooperate for it is in his best interests to do so. It was also explained to [redacted] he needs to be completely honest with the interviewing agents because if they do determine he is lying, his stay in Guantanamo Bay could become much longer than necessary.

[redacted] explained he has no reason to lie and has not done so to any of the interviewing teams he has dealt with. The interviewing agents stated, [redacted] knows the principal issue concerning his case [redacted]. The interviewing agents revealed they have sent [redacted] to the lab for fingerprint analysis and if [redacted] then it will be proof [redacted] after having denied ever knowing about [redacted] [redacted] smiled and proclaimed he was very happy to

[Redacted] did complain about how tired he was in defending himself. The interviewing agents offered encouragement and pointed out he had been moved up to level 2 within the camp as a sign of good faith.

The interviewing agents stated they did not plan to ask him any questions pertaining to his case today but they did ask him to focus on remaining cooperative for future interviews. [Redacted] then volunteered that following his arrest in Pakistan, he was moved to a place they called "The Dark Prison" because there was no light. At this prison, run by the Pakistanis, [Redacted] stated he was beaten, tortured and threatened with weapons. He remained in this prison for about one month. Subsequently, he was moved to Bagrum where he was interrogated by females after being stripped naked. [Redacted] was asked if his treatment in GUANTANAMO was better. He replied it was but he felt he was losing hope in getting home.
