- 2. (SBU) CONTINUED ATTACKS ON DEFENSE MINISTER EGGLETON

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THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS FOUND TODAY THAT DEFENSE MINISTER EGGLETON MISLED PARLIAMENT ABOUT WHEN HE LEARNED THAT CANADIAN SPECIAL FORCES HAS CAPTURED AL-QAIDA TERRORISTS AND TURNED THEM OVER TO THE U.S. A HOUSE COMMITTEE WILL INVESTIGATE WHETHER EGGLETON DELIBERATELY MISLED COMMONS AND WHETHER HE SHOULD BE CENSURED. WHILE LIBERAL CONTROL OF THE HOUSE MAKES EGGLETON'S CENSURE UNLIKELY, CALLS FOR HIS RESIGNATION CONTINUE TO BE HEARD FROM THE OPPOSITION.

THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED IN OCTOBER BY LEGER MARKETING FOR CANADIAN PRESS, A WIRE SERVICE ORGANIZATION. OTHER INTERESTING RESULTS:

- * 83 PERCENT SAID "NO" WHEN ASKED IF CANADA SHOULD FORBID PEOPLE OF ARAB DESCENT FROM ENTERING THE COUNTRY;
- * 87 PERCENT AGREE WITH THE IDEA OF REQUIRING ALL NON-CITIZEN PERMANENT RESIDENTS TO HAVE A PHOTO ID;
- * 86.6 PERCENT OF CANADIANS FEEL SECURITY MEASURES AT CANADIAN BORDERS ARE BARELY OR NOT STRICT ENOUGH TO SECURE THEIR SAFETY.
- U.S. AND CANADIAN BORDER OFFICIALS HAVE BEEN BUSY AS BEAVERS TRYING TO IMPLEMENT THE 30-POINT BORDER ACTION
